Facts and figures?



EUROMONTANA

- 36% of continental Europe is mountainous
- 17% of Europeans (continental) live in mountain areas
- 18% of Europe's agricultural holdings are in mountain areas (15% of Europe's agricultural utilized areas)
- 35% of PDOs and PGIs are produced in mountain areas
- Total output of mountain farming: €23.4 billion, (~8% of the total EU agricultural output)
- 14% of mountain areas cover by Natura 2000 sites
- 43% of Natura 2000 areas are mountainous
- 41% of mountain areas cover by forests



Our vision on mountain areas: Mountains are potential!

- Strengths:
 - The **positive image** of mountain areas
 - Intense community life
 - Very rich culture, traditions and heritage
 - The quality of life of mountain populations
 - Rare, preserved and renewable resources
 - Production of quality goods and services
 - Modern and often dynamic governance
 - •
- Weaknesses:
 - Remoteness and accessibility
 - Sparseness of businesses and population
 - **Competition** between economic development and environment
 - Sensitivity to climate change

- Mountain areas are distinctive areas of Europe which need to be addressed specifically.
- We call for **private and public investment** in these areas. The return on investments might be longer but will be **more sustainable**.





Objective:

to enhance the capacity of countries in the Carpathian region to promote sustainable agriculture and rural development in the Carpathians, providing benefits to the local people, based on the exceptional nature, landscapes and cultural heritage of the Carpathians.



Memorandum of Cooperation



Scope:

- Identifying, documenting, and disseminating successful experience and best practices on sustainable agriculture and rural development;
- Promoting exchange of data and information on sustainable agriculture and rural development;
- Mutually recommending experts upon request that could contribute technical expertise to related projects;
- Promoting networks of professional experts in fields related to sustainable agriculture and rural development;
- Develop joint projects;
- Mutual assisting in organizing conferences, seminars, training workshops, outreach and other extension services, and technical meetings on matters related to sustainable agriculture and rural development;
- Communicating the results of their joint work through joint press releases, via internet postings, joint publications in public, and general and professional media.



Key areas of collaboration

Pastoralism

- Focus on knowledge sharing between pastoral schools
- Focus on pastoralism as key instrument of landscape management
- In the pipeline: Horizon Europe project proposals on those issues
- Looking to join/build a consortium for Horizon Europe call for proposals on <u>Agro-pastoral/outdoor livestock systems and wildlife</u> <u>management</u>"
- **Open to collaboration** for 2026's international year of pastoralism (joint event, other communication initiatives)

Climate change adaptation

- Euromontana will be building a « Community of Practice » on climate change adaptation as part of the <u>MountResilience</u> project (2023-2027) to disseminate good practices to other regions through knowledge sharing activities. More news in the coming months.
- Carpathian mountains <u>already involved</u> in the project:
 - Râu Sadului, RO, as demonstration region
 - Podkarpackie, PL, as replicator region

- 16-18 October European Mountain Convention on « Smart mountain economies », Catalonia, Spain – Save the date!




What comes next? Highlights
