






The Carpathian Convention

- Signed in May 2003 by seven Parties (Czech Republic, Hungary, Poland, Romania, Serbia, Slovak Republic, Ukraine) entered into force in January 2006
- Conference of the Parties (COP1 2006 Kiev, COP2 2008 Bucharest, COP3 2011 Bratislava)
- Protocols on Biodiversity, Sustainable Tourism and Sustainable Forest Management
- Other topics covered
