- ACKNOWLEDGING that climate change and biodiversity loss continue to be among the dominant crises of our time with impacts that are global in scope and unprecedented in scale and thus ACKNOWLEDGING that FOREST EUROPE should enhance its efforts and commitments to address these challenges through sustainable forest management,
- RECALLING and BUILDING on FOREST EUROPE resolutions, declarations and decisions, specifically Strasbourg Resolution 4, Helsinki Resolution 4, Vienna Resolution 5, Madrid Ministerial Resolution 2 and the Bratistava Ministerial Resolution with relevance to climate change, biodiversity loss and forest resilience.
- 3. EXPRESSING CONCERN about negative impacts on European forests, and their services, arising from biotic and abolitic disturbances as well as combined effects, which are increasing in frequency, intensity and scale, and NOTING the urgency of immediate action to maintain and improve the health and vitality of forests, including their genetic resources, and ACKNOWLEDGING the importance of biodiversity to provide the multiple ecosystem services of forests for present and future generations.
- 4. RECOGNIZING the need to maintain and increase the resilience of forests and the forest sector while UNDERLINING that resilience depends upon the forests' health and adaptive capacity, thereby reducing vulnerability to a range of stresses, reflecting the functional integrity of the forest ecosystem and UNDERLINING the essential role sustainable forest management plays to maintain and enhance resilience.
- NOTING that climate change adaptation of European forests requires engaging in forest vulnerability assessments, disaster risk prevention, mitigation, preparedness, response, recovery and rehabilitation in accordance with the Sendal Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction.
- ACKNOWLEDGING that adapting forests to climate change and restoring damaged forests requires large quantities of appropriate and high-quality forest reproductive material and an increasing level of cooperation among European countries, without prejudice to the benefits and applicability of appropriate natural regeneration.






