









- The CICC welcomes the submission of the concept note for the "CARPATHIAN LIFE" Strategic Nature Project (SNaP) and its successful evaluation followed by an invitation to submit a full application for the second stage and supports the development of the related Carpathian Biodiversity Framework (CBF) Implementation Plan, outlining the activities to be undertaken during the CARPATHIAN LIFE project implementation. Recognizing the project's crucial role in advancing the substantive implementation of the CBF and its strategic importance for the Carpathian region, the CCIC encourages the Parties and relevant stakeholders to actively engage in the preparation of the full project proposal and support its successful evaluation and endorsement at all levels.
- Considering the LIFE SNaP Programme requirements, the CCIC invites Parties to consider an exceptional adoption procedure for the CBF Implementation Plan to ensure timely compliance; requests the Secretariat to proceed with the relevant procedural arrangements; and invites the COP Bureau to assist with the process.






- The CCIC welcomes the progress made in implementing the Set of measures support to Ukraine within the Carpathian Convention, especially the development of the project proposal for the GEF-8 project "Enhanced Protected Areas Network for Biodiversity Conservation and Development" in Ukraine, as well as the cooperation with UNIDO on the implementation of the project "Green Industrial Recovery through Municipality-Based Development in Ukraine" in the Carpathian region; in this regard, the CCIC requests the Secretariat and invites relevant stakeholders to further advance on undertaking relevant measures to support Ukraine.
- The CCIC welcomes the proposal of organizing the conference in 27-28 April, 2026, Vienna, Austria, titled "Ukrainian Carpathians Nature Recovery Dialogue", which aims at providing an overview of recovery needs in the Ukrainian Carpathians, presenting opportunities for donor engagement, and fostering strategic partnerships to advance both short- and long-term sustainable development and resilience initiatives in the region, thereby contributing to the implementation of the Ministerial Declaration of the Carpathian Convention on the impact of war on the environment in Ukraine and the Set of measures— support to Ukraine within the Carpathian Convention; and requests the Secretariat and relevant partners to support the donor conference organization.





- The CCIC welcomes the regional Carpathian Day initiative, including the events that took place in 2025 throughout the Carpathians. Furthermore, the CCIC invites the Parties and relevant stakeholders to organize and/or participate in a local Carpathian Day event on or around 26 September, and encourages organizers to consider organizing an event around the theme related to International Year of Rangelands and Pastoralists.
- The CCIC welcomes efforts of Romanian partners and support provided by the Secretariat to include the "Carpathian Mountains Day" as an official national celebration in Romania in liaison with the Parliamentary Commission of the Chamber of Deputies and the Senate responsible for relations with UNESCO and invites Parties to consider facilitating similar initiatives.





- The CCIC welcomes the initiative of the International Carpathian School and its celebration of the Carpathian Day in Ukraine, organized by the National Ecological Centre of Ukraine within the project "Shifting towards Ecotourism in Protected Areas through Heritage Interpretation", and co-financed by the governments of Czechia, Hungary, Poland, and Slovakia through the Visegrad Grants of the International Visegrad Fund; requests the Secretariat and relevant partners to continue actively engaging in these initiatives and their follow-up; and invites the Parties to support such efforts.
- The CCIC welcomes the International Award Corona Carpatica, which aims at promoting the cultural and natural values of the Carpathians as well as the principles of good international neighborliness, acknowledges the efforts of the Carpathian Biosphere Reserve in this regard, as well as its cooperation with the Secretariat. 

- The CCIC acknowledges the ongoing consultations between the Secretariat and UNEP's Corporate Services Division Legal Unit regarding the Secretariat's potential participation in the CARPATHIAN LIFE project as a beneficiary, and, considering the formal and administrative requirements related to UNEP's involvement in EUfunded programmes, the CCIC requests the Secretariat to continue liaising with UNEP to undertake all necessary measures to facilitate the Secretariat's full participation as beneficiary in the project. The CCIC emphasizes that the active involvement of the Secretariat is essential to ensure effective coordination among the Carpathian Convention Parties, foster stakeholder cooperation, and guarantee full alignment of project activities with the objectives and provisions of the Carpathian Convention.
- The CCIC also requests the Secretariat to review and consult possible improvements of the Secretariat services arrangement within the United Nations organizational framework to allow for project implementation, e.g. CARPATHIAN LIFE project, and provide related options until COP8.




- Further to the COP14 of the Convention for the Conservation of Migratory Species of Wild Animals and its adopted Concerted Action for the Eurasian Lynx, the CCIC recalls the proposal of developing a joint strategy for the conservation of the autochthonous lynx population in the Carpathian Mountains (Carpathian Lynx Strategy) under the auspices of the Carpathian Convention, the Convention on Migratory Species, and the Bern Convention. In this regard, the CCIC encourages the Parties, the Working Group on Biodiversity, the Large Carnivores Expert Group, relevant partners, and the Secretariats of the respective Conventions to undertake the necessary steps towards its development at the earliest convenience. Furthermore, the CCIC invites the Secretariats of the relevant Conventions to strengthen their cooperation for this purpose.
- The CCIC takes note of the Range-wide Strategy for the Rescue and Conservation of the Balkan Lynx (*Lynx lynx balcanicus*) 2026–2035 developed as a part of the Convention on Migratory Species COP 14 Concerted Action for the Eurasian Lynx, and invites Parties, Working Group on Biodiversity, the Large Carnivores Expert and other relevant stakeholders to consult and consider the Strategy with the view on strengthening cooperation for conservation of the Eurasian lynx and its subspecies in the region.



- The CCIC welcomes the cooperation between the Secretariats of the Basel, Rotterdam and Stockholm Conventions and the Carpathian Convention and the identified initial areas of collaboration, including developing a pilot project and a joint initial assessment of plastic pollution in the Carpathian region, aiming at developing broader policy and technical collaboration. Furthermore, the CCIC welcomes the proposal to develop a Memorandum of Understanding or a similar document between the Conventions and invites the Secretariat to make necessary arrangements in this regard.
- The CICC welcomes the joint policy brief developed in cooperation with mountain-specific alliances and cooperation platforms, including its draft recommendations for operationalising the climate-biodiversity nexus in mountain ecosystems through both the Convention on Biological Diversity and the UNFCCC.





♦ In the Footsteps of the Sheep How to Recognise Oscypek - Cheese from Traditional Pastoralism



Many cheeses on supermarket shelves may look local and traditional-but not all of them truly are. Terms like "mountain cheese" or "highland cheese" can be misleading. Only cheese made according to strict traditional methods-and with at least 60% sheep's milk-can be called Oscypek.

The PDO label: Protected Designation of Ori

Did you know?

Only products where every part of the production, processing and preparation process takes place in the region are awarded with the EU PDO label. This means when you buy oscypels accredited with a PDO label you can be sure it was entirely produced in the Carpathian Mountains.




Here's how to tell the difference and identify the authentic Oscypek:

- Name: The name oscypek is protected under EU law. Only cheese made following specific, rigorous methods may carry this name.
- Price: True oscypek is a handcrafted product and priced accordingly. A traditional oscypek weighing 600-800g typically costs between 70-90 PLN (approx. €20-25).
- Season: Genuine oscypek is only available from May to October, when sheep graze on mountain pastures and produce milk. If you see it sold outside this period, it won't be the authentic psynak.
- Place of purchase: Authentic oscypek is made in shepherds' huts (bacówkas) and these are also the best places to buy it.
- Label: Since 2008, oscypek has held the EU's Protected Designation of Origin (PDO) status.
   Look for the official PDO label as a mark of authenticity.
- Appearance: Real oscypek has a light, creamy color inside-slightly darker near the rind-and is never bright yellow.
- Texture: The cheese is firm and somewhat difficult to slice—much harder than many imitations
   Taste: Expect a bold, salty, and slightly spicy flavour.

And remember: Your choice to buy traditional products like this helps support pastoralist livelihoods—and plays a role in preserving biodiversity and cultural heritage!



### The Oscypek Museur

You like museums and want to learn more about Oscypec and other traditional cheeses? Then the Oscypek Museum in Zakopane is just right for you! Experienced highlanders will explain each step in the making of the cheese and tell stories of how the shepherds came to the Tatras. As a visitor, you can participate in a workshop where, under the watchful eye of shepherds, you can make your own cheese. You can also buy certified Oscypek and other cheeses from the local shepherd's hut, as well as handicrafts and regional souvenirs.

The Oscypek Trail is a trail along over fifty certified huts that produce regional and traditional products. There is an information board next to each hut, but during the grazing period from April to October, in each of the huts you also have the opportunity to talk with the shepherd, learn about the traditional way of kneading and decorating the cheese and much more.

- The CCIC welcomes the recommendation of the Working Group on Forests to continue developing the Carpathian Forest Inventory, aligning national and EU definitions with Carpathian Convention criteria on virgin and quasi-virgin forests, and to initiate preparing the guidelines on collecting information on quasi-virgin forests in the Carpathian region; invites the Working Group on Forests and relevant stakeholders to contribute expertise, data, and resources to this effort; and requests the Secretariat to support the process in this regard.






- The CCIC *supports* the Working Group on Forests' recommendation to initiate a dedicated workstream for forest-related support as a part of the broader Carpathian Convention support programme for Ukraine. In this regard, the CCIC *requests* the Secretariat and *invites* Parties, Working Group on Forests, and relevant stakeholders to support and contribute to this process.
